



Her "backdoor-to-the-brain" approach to phonics skill acquisition via the affective (social emotional/feeling) domain shifts the paradigms associated with traditional literacy skill instruction, and has gained national recognition with the No Child Left Behind, Reading First, and RTI Initiatives. As a featured and keynote speaker at educational conferences across the United States and abroad Katie shares "brain-changing' strategies for boosting existing reading curriculum and phonics instruction with the latest neural research showing how our brains learn best. Her practical and proven methods for bringing neuroscience into the forefront of literacy learning have been shared in both lecture and panel

discussions at Harvard University and MIT as part of the Learning and the Brain Conference and Research Consortium and are the subject of an upcoming professional development book series. 
Marriott Resort Floor Plan
